CONTENTS: This issue contains the minutes of the June 26 meeting, an updated event schedule plus updated event details, a planned attendance roster, and event reports on some recent activities.

NEXT MEETING: Tuesday, July 24th, 6:00 PM at the old Johnson County Courthouse Museum, 300 N. Main St., Warrensburg. Drill will start at 6:00 PM, the meeting at 7:00. Bring your musket for drill. To find the meeting, take Business 50 West to Carlyle Van Lines, turn South, & go about 1/2 mile.

EVENT SCHEDULE: Look at the event schedule & details and be prepared to let me know which ones you think you can attend. There is nothing wrong with attending only one day of an event if you cannot make both; it's better to see half an elephant than none at all. Also, don't let a lack of gear stop you. The Veterans carry lots of extra gear to loan to our new recruits, but we need to know to plan tentage, etc.

OTHER EVENTS: We've been asked to do honors in Jefferson City for Gen M.M. Parsons, who was killed by Juarista guerillas in Mexico in 1865. This is state SCV sponsored and in an area we've not recruited. Please mark Wednesday, August 15, on your calendar.

COMPANY RESOURCES: We still have bumper & window stickers, plus company powder. Anyone entitled to half a can from Carthage can buy the other half can for \$2.50 donation. Get your powder reservations in early, since some Yanks may buy out all the excess at Macon!

The event schedule was discussed. It appears if 10-12 people will be at Carthage; tents & transport are lined up. Macon turnout looks slightly less. The 3-5 preregistration for Athens looks good. Information on Belleville will be added to the EVENT DETAILS sheet.

Ronnie requested maximum attendance at Windsor July 4th. Todd & Ronnie will furnish tents, Dave the Jefferson Barracks tape, & Bill other tapes. 8:00 AM was the show time. committed are Bill, Charlie, Dave & Todd.

Bill requested everyone plan on the Warrensburg Fall Festival on Saturday, Sep 15th (8-5).

The Warrensburg Community orchestra could not mesh their schedule with ours. Bill will talk to the Whiteman Area Community Council on July 5th.

Powder & bumper stickers are available to members for a contribution. It was decided to press on with the hat/T-shirt logo as described with decison at Carthage since the proposed design wasn't available for the meeting.

George recommended that everyone join the Johnson County Historical Society in appreciation of the use of their facilities, and also to strengthen our voice should the Society be interested in sponsoring a Warrensburg event in 1992. Give Bill your tax-deductible dues of \$5 per calendar year on behalf of the Society.

FIFTH MISSOURI INFANTRY, COMPANY A (CSA)

EVENT DETAILS

MACON, MO, July 14-15. Unit MAX EFFORT. Located at Long Branch State Park, on lake, west of Macon. Macon is about 150 miles from Warrensburg via I-70 to Columbia, US 63 north. We preregistered 10-12 military, 3 civilian. Activities include parade & honors in town on Saturday, 2:00 PM battle, Sunday 1:00 PM battle. Tentative candlelight if reenactors want to do it. We've been asked about doing special honors in nearby town Bevier for LtCol R.S. Bevier of the 5th Mo. We will set it up after arrival. We'll also maintain a recruiting table when the camp is open. Info doesn't list amenities. Food will be raw foodstuffs. Impression is generic Reb, circa 1862.

ATHENS, MO, Aug 4-5. We preregistered 4-5 plus 1 lady. Located about 240 miles from Warrensburg via I-70, US 54, US 61, & MO 81 in NE corner of state. State DNR sponsored on original battlefield. Amenities include full rations, powder, caps, straw, wood, etc. Eevnt includes Saturday tactical demo in full east of river gear, Sunday portrayal of Athens battle. Saturday night dance will be old time music, not period. Battle had 1200 poorly armed rebs vs 330 home guard with Sprinfields & bayonets. Neither side had uniforms, except officers & some feds. Rebs described as barefoot, shirtsleeves, & some bareheaded, mixture of pants including Fed skyblue. Weapons prefer shotguns/hunting rifles, but Enfields acceptable w/o bayonets. NO FEDERAL ACCOUTERMENTS except canteens. Expect heat, but depart about 2:30 Sunday.

ST CHARLES, MO, Sep 22-23. Don't have much information. It will be generic Reb, lots of nice amenities including fancy dinner & a river boat ball. Those who've attended really like it. To get there, I-70 to St Charles, use either exit 228 or 229. This is a major metropolitan area.

BELLEVILLE, IL, Oct 6-7. They're redoing the battle of Belmont far from its original location. This is a St Louis suburb, near Scott AFB, & has \$20,000 budget for event. 200 acre site, meals, medals, powder, straw, wood, 50,000 spectators expected. Confederate infantry commander will be Layne Chartrand of the drilling 11th Miss. Impression is early war, reasonably well equipped, fully authentic, 2 or 3 band muskets.

September 15 (Sat): Warrensburg Fall Festival, drill demo & recruiting booth.

- * September 22-23: St Charles. Nice battle on riverfront. Two battles, parade, fashion show, dinner/ball, powder issue. See June CAMPAIGNER. Have not received requested info back yet.
- * September 29-30: St Joseph. Battle w/ tactical. Haven't received prereg package yet.
- * October 6-7: Belleville, IL. Reenactment of Battle of Belmont (November 1861). Battles both days. See EVENT DETAILS.
- * OCTOBER 20-21: WINDSOR. 5th MO MAX, 1862 MO impression. This is OUR event.
- * November 2-4: Cabin Creek, OK is CANCELLED. Funding for film fell through.
- * December 1-2, Prairie Grove, AR. Traditionally a good event, several actions. Haven't received pre-reg info yet.
