MINUTES OF MEETING HELD FEB 26, 1991

The meeting was called to order by President Riggs at 7:01 PM, at the Mo Public Service Bldg in Clinton. Attending were 9 veterans. 5 recruits, 2 non-combatants, 1 musician, & 8 guests. The minutes as published in the Messenger were accepted. The treasurer reported cash, checking & checks held of \$545.23.

Field officer reports were given. The 1st Sqt reviewed answers to the Drill Wuiz from the Messenger. Quartermaster listed equipment assets. Safety was briefed by 1st Sqt in absence of Safety officer. The authenticity program was not held due to the absence of the scheduled presenter, but Charlie Riggs indicated he intended to enforce tent & tobacco authenticity at all events. Larry Shanks discussed the need to be able to present a good Missouri (State Guard or civilian) impression in addition to generic Confederate.

The suggested By-law revision, after discussion, was tabled by unanimous consent.

The event schedule was discussed. KMOS pledge night volunteers included Bill, Mel, Charlie, Todd, Don, Keith, Kathy & George. The Grand Tactical was discussed; money was collected from 7 persons. All present indicated their intention to attend Wilson Creek & Weston. It was decided that we have enough interest to commit to Jeff City & Columbia LH events, but we'll decline the Pomme de Terre invitation.

The Spring Drill schedule of events was briefed. It was also agreed that Sandra will cater the lunch at a cost of \$3 per person, including sales tax.

The company indicated a lack of interest in purchasing large 5 MU breast plates due to authenticity problems. However, if they could be made small enough to be dog tags, we'd be interested.

The meeting ended at 8:30 PM.

President Jefferson Davis' triumphal tour from his home in Mississippi to his inauguration at Montgomery contrasts sharply with Abraham Lincoln's stealthy arrival in disguise at Washington City this month. In Kentucky there is talk of forming a new military company to attend the inauguration of the U.S. president. The company shall be called the LINCOLN DODGEFS; its uniform, a long military cloak (blue), and a Scotch plaid shawl. (Louisville Daily Courier, 2/27/61)

LATEST NEWS of February, 1861, compiled by our special correspondent, ME Rowe:

Missouri watches with sadness and alarm as the longthreatened disunion of the nation becomes irrevocable fact. South Carolina has refused Virginia's proposed mediation, declaring her secession final and absolute. The other States follow her example, and Texas joins them as the seventh member of the new Confederacy. Popular sentiment in Missouri overwhelmingly favors preservation of the Union AS IT IS, UNDER THE CONSTITUTION. Gov. Jackson has called a State Convewntion to decide our proper course in these troubled times. The majority of our citizens cast their votes for delegates pledged to support an honorable and Constitutional Union of the States, though a faction in St. Louis so engineered the city vote as to send to the convention men pledged to Union at any price, even the subjugation of our people and the abrogation of their rights. The faction now prepares the military arm to do its bidding: at its insistance some 350 federal troops under the command of Capt. Nathaniel Lyon have lately arrived in the city, whose federal garrison in now near 600 men. (Despite such preparations, it seems that their abolitionist friends have little faith in the St. Louis Dutchmen: Horace Greeley lately refused a speaking engagement in the city. for fear he would be mobbed.) We wonder at the true motives of the St. Louis patriots. Prominent bankers among them have defaulted on large loans from New Orleans banks. claiming that the Louisianans are now alien enemies of the Union! This is a novel way to escape the consequences of past speculations and the general stagnation of business prevailing in this State as elsewhere since the Panic of 1857. Let their fellow citizens repuke these thieves as the good people of Norfolk did the villains found in that town! Counterfeiters lately at work in that section of the State were captured in Norfolk this month and tried by the citizens assembled. On being found quilty, the rascals were soundly whipped, had one side of their heads shaved, and were ordered, on pain of worse use, never to show their faces again in the neighborhood. Could the nation be cleansed of its rascals, great and small, with such efficiency, the calamity bearing down upon us might yet be deflected. As to Missouri's future, we await the verdict of the State Convention now assembled at St. Louis.

Rumoers Flying: From Nebraska come reports that Disunionists occupied Old Fort Kearny on the 19th inst. and raised the Palmetto Flag bearing the motto "Southern Rights' Amid great excitement the Union party stormed the fort, tore down the Palmetto Flag and raised the Stars and Stripes. The federal commander at New Fort Kearney claims to know nothing of the incident. (Louisville Daily Courier 2/21/61)

VETERANS: Please read the agenda for Spring Drill & review your Hardee's & Drill/Manual of Arms guides. The readier you are, the less time we'll have to spend on review. Veterans will be expected to assist in teaching our recruits. In the morning we'll concentrate on School of the Soldier, led by your NCO's. In the afternoon, we'll go on into School of the Company (led by Capt. Bob). Bring at least 40 rounds; we'll do lots of firing.


RECRUITS: It's important that you attend this drill, so you'll be familiar with the basics & have seen some of the more advanced commands before your first event. I reiterate - don't worry if you don't have enough gear, just come on anyway & learn!

LADIES: Definitely attend - you can plan activities for camp, work on your impressions (clothes, personae, etc.), and perhaps prepare a few letters for our mail call.

LUNCH: 'Sandra will cater a lunch for \$3.00 including tax. Expect sandwiches, tater salad, beans, cake & ice tea. Unless you tell her otherwise, we'll expect everyone coming to eat. DO NOT bring a covered dish - the kitchen will be OFF LIMITS.

The Confederacy Abroad: Emperor Louis Napoleon of France this month pledged his nation's sympathy and support to the Confederate States, and to all peoples fighting tyranny and oppression. It is believed that France will shortly extend formal recognition to the new nation. The British government continues to deplore the situation in North America and is determined to discountenance disunion. (Louisville Daily Courser, 2/23/61)

NATIONAL TACTICAL, Land Between the Lakes, KY, March 15-17. A strenuous pack-in-everything tactical, no tents, no rations, hard core. 1862 impression - full uniform, leathers, 3-band rifles. First event for the 1st Confed Div & 4th Btn. Healthy people only, so 'you can expect to be cold, hungry & miserable.' Tactical begins noon Friday & runs thru noon Sunday, so expect to carry 200 rounds (rolled). If you want to go, get \$4.00 registration fee into Bill ASAP! Don't wait for the Feb 26 meeting! To find the event, take I-70 to St Louis, I-65 to I-57, I-57 south to I-24, I-24 to Ky Purchase Parkway, Purchase Parkway south to Benton, US 641 south to KY 80, KY 80 east to Golden Pond. About 250 miles from St Louis.

COMPANY DRILL, Cedarcroft Farm (Bill Wayne's place), Warrensburg. 9:00 AM - 4:00 PM, April 7. See the special handout in the March Messenger.

WESTON, MO, April 20-21. MCWRA & 5th MO MAX EFFORT. Three battles, 1 historic & 2 generic, assault on prepared positions (each side gets a day in the works & a day attacking them), night fire demo, dance, children's fair. Ladies will help interpret battle. As of 2/4, promise full amenities, including powder, prize drawing, etc. Large turnout is important. Impression: historic battle is Dec 61 homespun, etc. Generic is standard Reb. To get there, US-50 to I-435, I-435 to I-29, Platte City exit. About 90 miles from Warrensburg. Watch CAMPAIGNER for specific directions. OUR DEADLINE: 1 APRIL!

PEA RIDGE, ARK, June 1-2. National Battlefield Park living history, on one of least spoiled sites. Some drill demo, probably no shooting. Good chance to see the battlefield, especially at night. To get there, MO 13 to Springfield, US 60 to Monett, MO 37 to Gateway, US 62 west to park. About 200 miles from Warrensburg, but look for shorter ways on back roads.

SHOAL CREEK, Liberty, MO, June 15-16. MCWRA sanctioned event in village restored by Kansas City parks (to compete with Missouri Town?). A nice location, camp in shade, 1864 impression, no other info. Previous events here have been good. To get there from I-70/I-470 (Independence Center), take MO 291 north to Liberty, then MO 152 west across I-35 a couple of miles to Hodge Park sign.

BELMONT, Missippi County, Oct 25-27. MCWRA MAX. Looks like best of the year as far as amenities, etc. All meals prepared, shuttle across river to Columbus KY. Masked Ball Friday nite, Battles Sat & Sun, candlelight tours & night fire demo. Sat afternoon tea & fashion show for ladies. To get there: I-70 to St Louis, I-55 past Sikeston to Mo 80, Mo 80 east to site. About 170 miles from St Louis. OUR DEADLINE: Sep 1!

Answer to the questions from last month:

What's wrong with that company? The platoon split can't split comrades in arms. The right hand corporal must be a 2 and this one isn't. (You don't count the Captain/1st Sqt).

Guiz: C $(3-3/4^8)$. The space between front rank 1's does NOT compress when going into column of 4's. Since the the last corporal is a 1, his distance from the 1st Sgt remains the same.

Quiz: D (All of the above). A batallion guides on the colors, which are always in the center. On the left oblique, you can't see to the right (obviously). On a right wheel, we touch right & look left.

Now, for some questions on how to face the enemy. In the situations below, each answer will work. Your task is to see if you know how to do each manuever and know which is the most efficient. We'll do these at drill!

IN COLUMN OF 4'S, NORMAL ORDER, ENEMY APPEARS ON YOUR:

- 1. Front. On command, you execute:
 - a. By company into line, March.
 - b. By files right, March; Company, Halt; Front,
 - c. Halt: Front; Right wheel, March.
 - d. By files right, March; By the left flank, March.
- 2. Left. You execute:
 - a. By Company into line, March: Left wheel, March.
 - b. By the left flank, March.
 - c. By files left, March: By company into line, March.
 - d. Hait: Front.
- 3. Right. You execute:
 - a. By files right, March: By company into line, March.
 - b. Halt; Front; Face by the rear rank, about, Face.
 - c. By company into line, March; Right wheel, March.
 - d. On the right, by files, into line, March.
- 4. Rear. You excute:
 - a. Halt: Front: Left wheel, March,
 - Countermarch, by files left, March; By company into line, March.
 - c. Halt: About face; By company into line, March.
 - d. Halt: Front: Left turn, March.

IN LINE OF BATTLE, Enemy appears on your

- 5. Right. You execute:
 - a. Right wheel, March.
 - b. Right, Face; By company into line, March.
 - c. Right turn, March.
 - d. By the right flank, March; By company into line, March.
- 6. Left. You execute:
 - Left wheel, March.
 - By the left flank, March; By company into line, March.
 - c. Left turn, March.
- 7. Rear. You execute:
 - a. Face by the rear rank, about, Face.
 - b. Left wheel, March (180).
 - c. Hight, Face; Un the right, by files, into line, March.
