GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Age Limit. For participation on the field or carrying a weapon (in all service branches) participants must be 14 years old. The only exception is functioning musicians, who must be at least 12 years old. For artillerymen, members of a gun crew in positions I through 4 shall be at least 16 years old. All participants under the age of 18 must be under the supervision of a parent. legal guardian, or responsible adult who will sign a consent form at registration.

Uniforms & Accoutrements. Uniforms and equipage shall be appropriate for an early to mid-war impression common to the Eastern and Western theater of operations. Be flexible to adapt to each of the planned scenarios. At a minimum, uniforms and accoutrements will be of materials and design accurate for the period being portrayed. Authenticity inspections will be conducted by the respective military organizations.

Weapons. Infantry-military issue two or three band black powder muskets. This does not include Hawkins or Zouaves. Ramrods will be carried on the field but never drawn. NCOs are responsible for insuring that the troops do not draw the rammer. Fouled pieces will be given to a file closer who will be allowed to pull his rammer. from the file closer position, in order to clear the piece. Cavalry-carbines are encouraged. Artitlery-only original or full scale reproductions shall be accepted for participation. Full scale properly built mountain howitzers will be accepted for participation. Full scale properly built mountain howitzers will be accepted upon approval of the respective US/CS Artiflery Commanders. Pistogly-may only be carried by officers and NCOs as was appropriate during this period. No Wunder-Wads are allowed in revolvers. All weapons shall be in good working order with a functioning half-cock and a hammer screw. Weapons inspections shall be conducted by the respective military organizations each day. Military organizations have the right to refuse weapons on the field if found operationally unsafe or inappropriate for the secuence.

Edged. weapons. Knives carried will be of the period and secured in a period sheath. At no time will knives be drawn on the field. Bayonets should be carried by all enlisted men, but fixed only by order of a Commanding Officer. At other times they shall be secured in a proper scabbard. The scabbard must have a metallic tip to be carried on the field.

Ammunition. Powder will only be carried in the form of properly rolled carridges. A properly rolled carridge is defined as one rolled in soft type paper with no more than 80 grains of if or iff black powder. Penny wrappers, heavy bond paper, plastics, staples, or tape will not be used for rolled carridges. Percussion caps and carridges will only be carried in authentic cap pouches and carridges boxes. Under no circumstances will projectiles of any kind be on the site. Violators will be taken off the premises by local law enforcement officials for the duration of the event...no excuses or exceptions.

Millary Organization. The sanctioned overall military structure for this event is that of the North/South Alijance, which is comprised of the Western Brigade of the National Division (US), the 1st Confederate Division (CS), and their affiliated units. All units, are welcome, and shall be assigned to serve within this structure. This will include all Departments (Ordanace, Medical. Signal, Engineers, etc.). Unit commanders are responsible for the conduct of their unit and shall be held equally responsible for the misconduct of any of his troops. Troops shall obey all reasonable orders of designated military commanders.

Camps. Camps both military and civilian, shall be laid out and all participants shall camp in assigned areas. Unit flags may be flown during arrival times to aid in finding your camps. Once camps are closed to vehicles, only one designated flag for each battainto will be allowed. No company flags will be flown in camp or carried into battle. Fires shall only be permitted in designated kitchen area (not in the company streets). All fire pits must be filled in and trash properly bagged for pickup at the end of the event.

Women in the Banks. Female troops shall be allowed in the ranks ONLY if she does not show the obvious

Yehicle Access. Vehicles will be restricted from the camps at designated times. THIS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.

Personal Conduct. No illegal substances will be allowed or tolerated. Offenders will be turned over to law enforcement officials for arrest and prosecution.

the development of American civilization from Revolutionary days down to the Civil War. Very educational and interesting reading."



Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of a copy of your October, 1993 issue and am disturbed by that portion of the newsletter which reported on the "unpleasant situation" between the Federal cavalryman and a member of the Big River Artillery. I have found a number of errors in the recounting of the incident by the cavalryman which I believe need to be corrected. I shall address these in the order I found them in the report.

Initially, the event was a "1992 LISTED EVENT" as stated in the October, 1992 issue of The Western Cambalgner. The Versailles Chamber of Commerce sponsored the event and the lady who was in charge of it has been contacted. I have been assured that the Chamber is still in possession of the cancelled check (made out to the N.C.W.R.A.) to cover the insurance costs for the event. She is also searching the telephone records to locate the number of the M.C.W.R.A. officer she spoke with about the specific insurance costs for the event.

The sponsors of the event did have releases printed. However, the Chamber failed to assign any of their members to ensure that the forms were filled out and returned by the reenactors who attended.

The cavalryman's claim that he took a hit while on his horse and that while taking this hit his sabre accidently cut the Artilleryman's hand is simply untrue. Near the end of the skirmish, he crossed a small ditch on foot with his sabre out of it's scabbard and proceeded to the area where the Artilleryman was lying on the ground, pretending to cavalryman made two (2) stabs at the propertival, the cavalryman made two (2) stabs at the propertical articleryman, one of which produced the wound.

If you doubt the veracity of what I have just written, I would be happy to arrange for you to view a videotape of the skirmish which clearly proves that the cavalryman was on foot at the time of the incident. If you're still in doubt after viewing the video, I can arrange for you to interview one of our members who was in very close proximity to the Artilleryman at the time of the incident. He witnessed the entire episode and is willing to testify as to what happened.

Finally, on this topic, I spoke with the Artilleryman a number of weeks following this incident. His employer had basically put him on unpaid leave due to his inability to hold and utilize the tools of his trade. Faced with several weeks of no income and having a wife and. I believe, five children to care for, his last resort was to seek for children to care for, his last fer estre at the Artilleryman Knowing "the dangers involved in his actions," I find a great deal of fault in the cavalryman's deliberate actions at Versailes. Perhaps, instead of us should be trying to locate more suitable insurance coverage for the Association's members. It is my understanding that The Living History Association, based the Cigna Insurance Company to provide them with a quote the Cigna Insurance Company to provide them with a quote on extending the coverage to the actions of another reenactor. Why isn't the Association pursuing this same type of coverage to the Association pursuing this same type of coverage to the Association pursuing this same type of coverage to the Association pursuing their families?

Having, hopefully, cleared up what actually took place at Versailles. I would now like to ask why you believe the 3rd Englineers "aren't noted for their authenticity & safety consciousness". What portion of our portrayals do you find fault with? Perhaps you are unaware that is spent two full days at Fort Leonard Wood in the rare book section of the Englineer School Library and Mussum researching specific tasks assigned to Confederate Englineer. Our military members must select a craft from among these tasks, research it, and prepare displays, charts, models, etc., with which to educate the general public. Our uniform requirements are as close to the regular Confederate Army's General Order No. 9, dated 6 June 1861, as we can make them and still be relatively economical for those just getting into the hobby. The kinds of weapons we utilize are of the type used by soldiers who also had to carry tools, surveying equipment, etc. During the hours that the camps are open to the public, we strive to make ours as period-looking as possible. In our discussions with the public, we strive to make ours as period-looking never attempt to fool anyone about who we are or why our

GENERAL CIRCULAR.

This circular is being sent to all brigades, battalions, companies, and batteries in the Division to inform you of upcoming events and other news affecting the Division. PLEASE be sure this information is disseminated to all in your command. Some of this will repeat information already sent to Bde and En commanders.

1. During the January meeting, a number of items were brought up — and a few were even resolved.

a. The size of a battalion was settled at no less than 135 enlisted men in the ranks. This means shooters - not officers, staff, or file closers. The size of a company was set at no less than 30 EM not counting file closers. That means a battalion will have approximately a minimum of 150 people. This of course only applies to the two North/South Alliance events held each year and does not affect local or regional events. It does not affect the way you are currently organized. It only means that if battalions cannot meet these numbers at these two events they may be consolidated.

- b. A proposed set of by-laws was advanced so that the Division leadership may make decisions and have elections in an orderly manner. This set off the usual controversy with agreement only on the above sizes of units so far. It was proposed to have a Council of Commanders consisting of the Division CG and the artillery, cavalry, and two infantry brigade commanders to make the normal decisions for the Division. It was further proposed to have a Board consisting of the Council and all battalion commanders to have equal votes to make major Division decisions and to direct the activities and plans. To this end the Cavalry was alloted three battalions for four total votes and the Artillery was alloted three battalions for four total votes and the Artillery was also given a total of four votes. Currently the First Inf Bde has four votes (Bde CG and three Bn CO's) and the Second Inf Bde has five votes (Bde CG and four Bn CO's). As battalions are added they will also have a vote. Although the Council and Board have not been officially accepted (the by-laws are not accepted yet!) we are proceeding along by the consensus of these individuals. What this means to you as a unit commander is that you should make your voice heard through your battalion CO's input and vote.
- 2. Belmont This is the designated Division Fall event gince May this year! We had planned on a Tactical in Indianapolis, but the Board's consensus was that you wanted to go to Belmont, MO so we changed. If you have not registered for Belmont and want to go, contact the Belmont committee listed in the enclosed brochure directly and tell your Bn CO. There is still a little time.
- a. This is an early war impression ala Wilson's Creek. Shotguns and flintlocks are acceptable and all the early war paraphenalia is appropriate though limit the luxuries somewhat. The troops had been ferried over from Columbus, XY and would not have had all the niceties. Wedges and officer wall tents are appropriate and dog tents are not. (This is 1861; dog tents were issued to the Federals starting in 1862.) However, if that's all you have come on anyway.

- b. Many units were in Polk's Division (later Corps) and were from Tennessee. The flags were most likely the Polk pattern red St. George's cross (vertical) on blue background with 11 to 13 stars non-uniformly spaced on the cross. The 2nd, 5th, 13th, 13th, 13th, 22th, 2nd, and 154th TN Inf Reg'ts were some of the units as well as the 11 LA Inf, 13th AR Inf, 1st MS Cav Bn, and Smith's Battery. It will be up to your Bn and Ede CO's as to which units you will portray.
- c. Each battalion camp will be inspected according to the attached sheet and a "Best Camp" streamer will be awarded. This inspection is not to critize anyone but to recognize those who have put in extra effort.
- d. As you can see from the attached schedule a number of interesting activities are scheduled horse races, sick calls, pay call, revival, ladies tea, cavalry obstacle course, wedding, barn dance, and huge chicken and catfish dinner.
- The two battles will be centered around replica earthworks and a cornfield which should prove to be enjoyable. There will be plenty of action for all branches.
- f. Currently over 1500 people are signed up with more on the way.
- g. Bde Commanders are enjoined to carefully read the schedule as there are a number of duties at Division HQ to be performed by your men.
- 2. Red River Campaign BG J. H. King informs us that the RRC committee has decided that they cannot support this event as a Division or Alliance event. They are continuing it as a regional event. We are disappointed but understand the logistical problems and are sympathetic. It is a most unusual event and we know many of you will want to go. You should contact BG King for information. We wish you all a good time and wish the RRC Committee a successful event!
- 3. Spring 1994 An event to take place in Memphis on Memorial Day weekend is being planned by the North/South Alliance (us and the federal Mestern Brigade). This event is sponsored by the Mid-South Reenactment Association, a private group from Memphis. Some of the details are extremmely interesting and unique in reenacting.
- a. The basic outline for the event is to have "Great Moments in Civil War Battles". Not just to have a reenactment for an anniversary of a battle, but two western and two eastern battles during the weekend. As far as the names of the battles themselves, some have been mentioned; but we are still working on the details.
- b. There will be a small registration fee, from which part of the proceeds will be spent in the area for historical perservation.
- c. The sponsor has offered to furnish some "give-aways" for the event such as a full scale cannon to an artillery bettery, Spencers to cavalry units, tents and muskets to infantry units. There would be drawings to determine who got what. Details will become clearer on these prizes.
- d. The North/South Alliance travelled to Memphis, all expenses paid, to review the property and discuss the event on August 21st. At this point a majority feel that we should continue the planning process for next Memorial Day
- e. We have been in contact and continuing to contact units outside the Alliance, such as the National Regiment, the Cumberland Guard, etc.

ou will hear much more about this later

- 4. Fall 1994 We have a commitment from the Western Brigade to sponsor a Tactical in Indiana in September-October. This is a reschedule of the Fall 1993 event replaced by Belmont ths year. They are going forward with the planning, and more details are forthboaning.
- i. Spring 1995 At Colonel Nick Medich's (Bn CO 1st Inf Bde) request we are looking into the possibility of a reenactment of Pea Ridge, AR. We have been in contact with Division Colonels John Beck, Scott Hughes, and Jim Cook, who are from that area. They have selected a tentative site on part of the original fletd. Plans are are moving forward on firming up the sponsorship at this time. More details later.
- 6. Fall 1995 Several meetings have been held with a local group in Spring-hill, TN to sponsor a reenactment of Springhill, Franklin, and Nashville. They have seed money, have locked up 275 acres, and are working on several hundred more acres ... right in the middle of the Springhill battlefield! All monies will go toward the preservation of the Springhill, Franklin, and Nashville battlefields.
- 7. Future Events We have been talking, or just beginning to talk to the Liaison Committee, our estrem counterpart, about an event somewhere in the middle ground between the two theaters ... possibly in the Knoxville or Chattanooga area. Also being discussed is a trip to an eastern event.
- They, as well as we, are interested in getting both organizations together some time in the future. Some of us will attend their meeting in November, and we certainly hope that they will attend ours in 1994.
- 8. Division Meeting The tentative plan is to meet in January in Memphis. All are welcome. Remember to speak through your Bn and Bde CO's.

MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDING GENERAL, Major-General Al Gatlin

We are closing on our fourth year of existance, and we have accomplished most of the goals that we have set for the Division. We have done this without a lot of mrsunderstandings among ourselves, which is unusual for the reenacting! We have had our good times and not so good times, but in all we have done an outstanding job in our presence on and off the field.

From the grand charge at Franklin to the spectacular formations at Murfreesboro we have given our people real experiences to remember! The field movements and confusion of LBL were as our forefathers had experienced.

The final day's battle at Perryville was absolutely grand in its exact troop movements and the panoramic views we gave the crowd as well as our selves. The pulse-pounding anticipation and excitement of the cornfield at Wilson's Creek will long be remembered. Just a flash was all you needed to bring to life that book you read or a vision of the way things must have been 130 years ago.

As you can see we still have many, many events to participate in during the next few years. We still have lots of hard work for many to do, lots of time to spend away from family, and lots of money to steal from the budgets of our personal lives. It takes all of us, not just a few, not just the Board and their staffs, but all 2500+ of us to make the events successful. Every man from the highest ranked general to the newest private is responsible for the success of these events.

Communication is the formula for success and how much each one of us contributes to the events. Communication is the mortar that holds us together and gives direction to the Division. It is the hardest part of reenacting and must be continually worked on for us to be cohesive; it will not happen by itself.

We in the Division NQ work very hard at informing you of things that are important (and maybe some things that are not so important) to your reenacting experience. We feel that that if we keep you updated then all of us can make things smoother in the field for our men. We have had our problems and there have been problems at lower levels. Sometimes we will fail to get you the information you need, but always realize that these problems are NOT because of a lack of commitment or interest from your Division, Brigade, or Battalion commanders!

We need our help in letting us know when you are not getting what you need. The Board works for the Division - you and your men - and we need your imput to make sure that we are going in the right direction. As unit commanders you are, therefore, responsible for communications up and down. The First Confederate Division has accomplished some major tasks in reenacting over the past years, but it was done as a team, not by one. Let's continue as a team toward higher and brighter goals! ... Hats off to you gentlemen for a job well done.

camp (a sixty day to six month "encampment") looks different from that of an Infantry unit (an army basically "on the move").

Regarding our "safety consciousness", we abide by the M.C.W.R.A. safety inspection requirement prior to each battle, even when the organizers of an event do not hold a general inspection. Last spring, at Makanda, Illinois, we refused to allow some Illinois Engineers to carrain weapons on the field because the weapons were not in a safe operable condition. Further, we make every in a safe operable by the M.C.W.R.A.'s safety rules for Infantry type units during engagements.

In closing, I would like to state that prior to reading your newsletter. I had the utmost respect for your unit and its leaders. However, I now wonder about a unit that prints an advisory to it's members regarding "Rumor Subsequent page prints only one person's view of an unfortunate incident without making any attempts to "determine the truth". Still, if you have some specific safe conduct at events I would be interested in receiving them In writing.

Letter sent to 3rd Engineers in response to their letter:

Dear Greg,

I sincerely regret any misunderstanding that my article in the October Fifth Missouri Messenger may have caused. The opinions stated were strictly my own and there was no intent to demean your unit. I will publish your letter in an upcoming Messenger along with this response.

The intent of the article was to caution members about the critical nature of safety, especially in hand-to-hand combat. It is entirely possible that the facts are not as reported to us or that I did not interpret the report properly; I made no detailed notes. Regardless of the facts, our members were shocked that one reenactor would sue another over a reenacting accident, even if the injuring party was negligent & the injured party without fault. We were concerned that a precedent would be established that would cause significant harm to the future of reenacting. Of course, if there is reason to believe that the action was deliberate, perhaps action should be pursued through MCWRA & the individual's unit to ban him from the field.

As stated in the article, our unit did not press for attendance at this nearby event because we did not believe that it was MCWRA insured or sanctioned. Generally, events shown as "listed" are not insured & have not been voted on by the MCWRA Board; the Board minutes do not indicate that the event was voted on. As to the failure of the town to obtain the releases, my experience is to not trust them to take care of obtaining them, precisely because I want to protect myself & my unit, to the maximum extent possible, from lawsuits. One would not think that they'd need supervision, but they often do - something one learns as the unit sponsors more events.

I agree that some sort of insurance protection for injured reenactors would be a worthwhile goal for MCWRA to pursue. Since a new Board & officers will be taking office shortly, you might wish to address this problem to them (but I suspect that, by raising the issue, you'll volunteer to participate in a research committee).

I agree that my comment about your authenticity and safety conciousness was overstated & I herewith tender my apologies. The thoroughness of your research of the engineers' role is unquestioned. The major authenticity 'problem' relates to your integration of family members into the military camp & your vote against the sanction of 1994 events which would not allow joint camping. The safety 'problem' relates to the difficulty of safely employing a unit, such as yours, which operates outside the immediate control of the on-field branch commanders.

I have no desire to sour the hitherto excellent relationship between our units by comments made 'on deadline.' We appreciate the assistance you provided in planning a fortification for us, although we have not yet been able to execute the plans. We certainly have no intent to exclude you from events that we sponsor.

After discussion of precedent, carried with 3 opposed.
