SEND HOLD TO THE TROOPS!

To Johnny Reb & Billy Yank, just as for soldiers today, letters from home were like gold. Because of the importance of mail in the lives of the soldiers we portray, we will try to make mail call a more frequent occurance at events this year. With a little pre-planning and a minimum amount of effort, we can come up with some very lively scenarios.

Writing period correspondence is easier than you might think. Once you get over the initial hurdle of deciding on topics, it can be quite fun. For ideas, one suggestion is to read the diaries of women of the time and then picture yourself in the situations described, and create a letter about it. "Dear John", and flirtatious letters were surely written in all wars, along with the more mundane reports on the crops, the state of family members' health and other activities of daily life at home.

You can also read actual soldiers' letters and then create the original letter the soldier may have responded to. In fact, the reading of original letters will help you on several levels. Not only are they a fertile source for period subject matter, but you'll also get a feel for the grammar and spelling that may have been used. Bell Wiley's book "The Life Of Johnny Reb" has an excellent chapter dealing with how educated and uneducated southerners wrote.

The soldier's reactions to the contents of the letters are a big part of the letter writing/receiving process at events. In a typical scenario the ladies of the unit would write letters to soldiers (usually their husbands) and then also write a few generic ones for the single guys so that everyone got something. The guys can get involved by writing letters, too. The idea is that the recipients never know whether they'll be receiving a letter from a loved one or from the bank about the money owed them. You might even get a "good customer" coupon from a house of ill repute, for example.

The best way to do this is to write letters in advance of an event. Put "post-it" notes on the outside of the generic letters describing their content so they could be addressed to an appropriate soldier just prior to mail call at the event. Some ideas I've seen include a letter that might land a certain soldier in the guardhouse until a certain young lady's father could come and let him know his "options" regarding his future with his daughter. Or, maybe a pair of rather flirtatious letters from one young lady attending the eventto a couple different soldiers (even better if written without her knowledge!) A husband could get a letter from his wife explaining that the man from the next farm was being "very helpful" to her in his absence, anduse it create a skit demanding leave or release from service. This could allbe made even funnier by the inclusion with the letter of a repro CdV of a frightenly homely woman.

A few other ideas include a letter relating that grandpa had an accident with the mule. Due to bad grammer and spelling it looks like grandpa had to be put down instead of the mule. A letter from the local brothel about non-payment of services. (This is good to send the Quartermaster before paycall, then pay can be procured from the soldier at fault). A note from a love-struck thirteen year old, addressed to an older bachelor. A letter of appreciation from a company to a customer because their profits have gone up since he has started using their product (for example a nearby hotel if the recipient is "motel milish"). If you know their place of employ you can write gossipy letters using names of their real co-workers.

Of course for full effect, each letter recipient must read his letter aloud, but this doesn't all have to take place at pay call, else it would take forever to complete the scenario. Instead, letter sharing among groups of several soldiers throughout the camp mmediately after pay call and for the balance of the weekend will add a nice touch to the "living history" experience for the public.

For a period look and feel to your correspondence, you can purchase some of the stationery available from various suttlers. Dixie Leather Works is a good source for this. However, simple is sometimes better. A plain piece of paper and a pencil will do nicely. Or you can use a fountain pen or art quills. Don't use a ball point. Another nice period touch is to write on the back of scrap wallpaper, or make your envelope out of such paper.

Still need ideas? What do you write about today? Put those things into a 19th Century context and write away!

DETAILS OF 5TH MO UPCOMING EVENTS

Mar 2 MCWRA BALL. Lodge of the 4 Seasons in Osage Beach. MCWRA general membership meeting at 10 a.m. Plowman-Moulton wedding at 6 p.m. in Eagle's Peak Room, preceding ball. Take US 54 to BUS 54 to HH.

Mar 30-31 SPRING DRILL & MUSTER. On site of this summer's Cole Camp reenactment. School of the Soldier, School of the Company. Possible Saturday evening meal provided. Regimental meeting Sunday morning at 9. You may arrive Friday evening. Site is approximately three miles east of Cole Camp on US 52.

Apr 13-14 Davisville, MO. Tactical. (Proposed) Sponsors now say they want infantry for two battles. Packet has been requested, but not received yet.

May 4 Climax Springs, MO. "VFW Loyalty Day". (Proposed) We've been invited to set up a living history and march in their parade. Recruiting Opportunity. Located midway between Warsaw and Camdenton off MO 7. Call the 1st Serg't NOW if you can attend.

May 17-19 THE WILDERNESS. Orange, Virginia. National Event. Scenerios include a Wilderness Tactical in the woods Saturday morning, Saunders Field Saturday afternoon, and Widow Tapp Farm Sunday afternoon. No events Friday except school children touring camps. Impression is FEDERAL Army of the Potomac. There is a one way road through the site past CS camps, sutlers, to the US camp and to US parking. US Registration is separate and located at the edge of the US camp. There will be a separate US civilian camp for all 1st Confederate Division dependents. All western Federals and we galvanized western Confederates will serve under Gen. Al Gatlin (of the 1st Confederate Div.) Since all cross-dressing rebs will be forming one full-size 1000-man Regiment, all 4th Battalion troops will be consolidated into one 100-man Company under the command of Col. (Capt.?) Beck. Therefore, we'll all go prepared to fall in as musket-toting Yankee privates.
