
BATTLE OF PILOT KNOB IRONTON, MO SEPTEMBER 22, 23, 2001

Gentlemen this is the last year this event will be held on the original battlefield. The battle occurred in the fall of 1864 General Price attacked a federal occupied earthen fort at Ironton Mo. The battle cost Price several thousand men and the ability to implement his plan of attacking St. Louis.

The Uniform will be Civilian attire with some federal uniforms mixed in some gray uniform jackets may also be used. I the past the park has provided raw food but I do not know at this point. We may have to employment the Mess when we arrive onsite.

The best route is:

- 1. Highway 63 south to Vichy.
- 2. At Vichy take Hwy 68 to St. James.
- 3. At St. James take Hwy 8 to Potosi.
- 4. At Potosi take Hwy 21 South to Ironton.
- 5. The site is on Hwy V just off Hwy 21 (look left)

- 1861 Civilian state guard uniform
- Federal uniform
- Early war firearm shotgun, Kentucky rifle, 1842
 Springfield, Enfield or Springfield will do.
- Caps and Cartridges for the weekend. (I'm mot sure if we will be firing or not)
- Any living history items you may have.
